think most little girls want their daddy. I know I did. But my dad was an alcoholic who'd disappear from my life for years at a time.

So I looked for love in all the wrong places. I got pregnant when I was 14 — and had an abortion. After that, I went into a huge depression. I felt different from all the other kids and like I was never good enough.

The only people I felt attracted to were a string of older men who were physically and verbally abusive. I ended up with four children fathered by four different men, all of them bad guys.

But in 2006, my father got sober and came back into my life. He even moved in with me and my kids. For two years, it was really great — until he started drinking again. In

fact, it got so bad he ended up in the hospital in a coma.

And I had to make the decision to pull the plug on him.

I felt like I killed my own father. That's when I started doing meth real bad. Meth numbed me from the world — and my life went straight downhill. I ended up in jail and my children were taken from me. I hit bottom.

Giving it all up

But that's also when everything changed. When I got out of jail, the courts sent me to the Kokomo Rescue Mission's Open Arms, a shelter and program for homeless women.

Oh, I struggled, at first. I wanted to stay in control of my life. But one day, a staff member said, "Jennifer, you gotta give it all up. Your past, everything." I went upstairs

and cried and cried. But she was right. I gave up my guilt for the abortion and for my father. I gave myself up to Open Arms and to God. And now, for the first time in my life, I feel like I deserve a better life. I'm going to make it.

After the **FLOOD**


s the floodwaters of Kokomo's Wildcat Creek started to rise last April, I wasn't too worried — at least, not at first. After all, the water hadn't yet reached the first step outside my house, and I thought the worst of it was over.

But I was wrong, The water kept rising. So later in the day, when I saw boats floating down my street, rescuing stragglers like me, I told them I'm ready to go.

It was just one more challenge in my life. I'm used to challenges. I was born with Spina Bifida. While life wasn't easy for a kid like me, my parents always encouraged me to set my own limits and confront hardships head-on. As a result, I grew up more mature than many of my friends. And I realized early, if I don't do something myself, no one else is going to do it for me.

Still, the hardships I've faced didn't get easier. At one point, I ended up living under a bridge in Dallas, Texas. I overcame that challenge and moved to Las Vegas. But when the economy went south in 2008, I found myself unable to find work and struggling financially again. So I tried moving to Kokomo.

Well, when it rains, it pours, they say. And that sure came true in April, when



I got flooded out of my home. But the good news is, the Red Cross sent me to the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

I'm a Christian, and I've never done drugs or alcohol. The Mission has helped me strengthen my faith and remember that life is much more important than the things I lost in the flood.

It's also been an eye-opener spending time with the other guys here who ARE struggling with addictions. Thanks to my experience here, I'm now considering going back to school to study counseling, so I can help other men like these.


