

A Special Purpose - by Shana

he day Shana was born, a nurse predicted that one day her voice would be heard across the nation. "I believe God has a special purpose for me," says the 26-year-old single mom at Open Arms. "I just don't know what it is yet."

Shana's life story is painful to hear. She was still a young girl when she was diagnosed with cerebral palsy, a neural disease that affected her ability to walk — and led to teasing from her classmates. Worse, she was repeatedly molested by family and "friends" of the family. And her mother was a drug addict and alcoholic who couldn't protect her.

"I felt like a loner," she recalls. "I stayed in my room

and tried to avoid everyone as much as I could. And I bottled up my emotions so I never had to feel anything."

At 17, Shana finally found someone she believed truly loved her. He later abandoned her for another woman — but not before she gave birth to her only daughter, Destiny, now 3. "The day Destiny was born was magical," she says. "Before, I didn't care about anyone or anything. But she changed my life."

Loved for the First Time

Unable to work because of her disability, Shana needed help. "I was scared," she says. "I know I can't physically do the things other parents do for their children, but it hurts

to admit it." Then Shana and Destiny came to Open Arms.

Not only did Shana and Destiny receive safe shelter and three meals a day, she found caring people who truly loved her for the first time in her life. "When everyone prayed for me I felt a release.

God told me I'm where I'm supposed to be and everything would be all right. The ladies here support me, even when I don't ask for it. They make me feel like I'm good enough and strong enough to make it.

'The women here are the family I never had," she adds.
"I believe that everything that's happened to me, happened for a reason. It's all God's plan.
Because He has a special purpose for me."

This fall and Thanksgiving, I pray you continue to remember all the lonely, brokenhearted people who will come to us. And I know you will. Because you love people just as He has loved you.



Out of the Cardboard Box

"Sobriety is the biggest thing I've gotten here."

ne day last year, a doctor asked Shawn, 40, whether he'd consider quitting his drinking. He thought for a moment, recalling his legal and financial troubles. Health issues. Rotting teeth. Lost marriages. A "home" that consisted of a piece of plastic for a roof and a sleeping bag. And most of all, his failure as a father.

"No way am I gonna stop drinking," he told the doctor. "I don't want nothin' to do with sobriety."

The shame, weight, and responsibility of cleaning up his life were too much. "There was a time I wanted to be the best dad in the world," Shawn explains. "But I was homeless. How do you say to your kids, 'Hey, you wanna come visit your dad in a cardboard box?' It was easier to stay drunk."

Shawn had been drinking and smoking pot since he was 13. "From day one, I went straight off the map," he says. And his life slowly spiraled out of control. By 2011, he had three children he couldn't support. Several DUIs, as well as unresolved legal issues affected his ability to work. Then he lost his job, his savings, and his apartment. He was homeless.

God Led Shawn to the Kokomo Rescue Mission

In September 2014, however, Shawn finally sat on a curb and had a heart-to-heart conversation with God. He confessed the mess he had made of his life and asked God what to do. God led him to the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

"I came to the Mission because I wanted to get my life on track," Shawn says. "God said He'd get me sober, get me a job, and get me out of here. And that's what's happening."

Shawn says every part of this program has helped him: chapels, devotions, work, structure and rules, and connections to resources all over Kokomo. But the most important thing is sobriety.

"Sobriety is the biggest thing I've gotten here," he explains. "I don't drink anymore. I make good decisions, I do more grown-up things. And I'm working again. God did that. God and the Kokomo Rescue Mission. I'm finally ready to be a productive member of society again."
