've been drinking ever since my uncle gave me my first beer, when I was 21. I was an alcoholic from day one. I'm not sure why. All I know is, I did not enjoy being sober. And drinking made me feel good.

For awhile, my drinking didn't cause me too many problems. I worked at different restaurants and a couple of factories. So I did OK. But then I got married in 2009. I didn't want to do it. I just wanted to keep dating. I knew I wasn't ready to be married. But my girlfriend insisted, so I agreed.

At first, it wasn't bad. We got along. We even had a little boy in 2010. But then we started having problems. One problem was that she didn't like my drinking. Maybe I should have seen it coming. But two years ago, I was totally shocked when the sheriff showed up at my work with a subpoena. My wife was divorcing me. And I haven't seen my son since, because her family won't let me.

After that, I thought I could deal with my drinking problem alone. But after I lost my job because of drinking, I knew I couldn't. So in June 2014, I came to the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

Reminded of God's Love

This place has changed my whole life. The people here really like me and support me, and I see God helping me every day. I especially like the devotions and chapels,

because they always remind me how much God loves me.

Then, about a month ago, one of my old bosses hired me back, so I'm not only sober, I'm working again. I know I could afford to move out today, but I don't want to yet. I'm still getting so much out of God's Word here.

The only thing missing now is my son. But I know if I stay faithful to God, I'll get to see him again, sooner or later. That would be the best Christmas present ever.

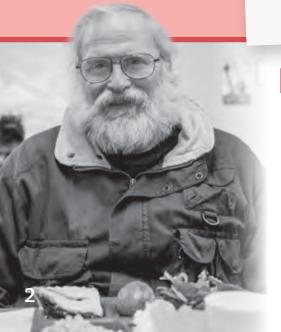

abusive, alcoholic father. Afraid of living everyday life. Afraid of connecting with or relating to people.

"It's a social anxiety thing," she explains.
"I remember times when I couldn't even order a pizza on the phone because I didn't want to talk to them."

What she wasn't afraid of were drugs and alcohol. "When I was 18, I started going to raves and drinking and doing all kinds of drugs — ecstasy, acid, meth, anything I could get my hands on. But mostly it was cocaine," Holly says.

"They forced me to come out of my shell a little bit. And they're showing me how to do things the right way."

At the age of 24, Holly's life took a dramatic turn when she gave birth to her son, Jaden. Her fear and anxiety increased. "It was so traumatic," she admits. "I had this baby. I didn't know what to do. I was just so lost. That's when I started to drink heavily. It was the easiest solution to deal with everything."

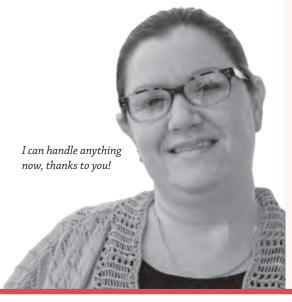
Over the past 11 years, drinking cost Holly her job, her apartment, and her health. "My anxiety went through the roof," she says. "All I could do is drink and sleep all day. My blood pressure shot up and I had problems with my legs." Her drinking even cost her her family.

When she finally had no one left to turn to, she came to Open Arms.

Finding Faith and Strength

"When I got here, I got baptized. My faith, knowing that God is there for me and will take care of everything, gave me the strength I needed to deal with all my anxiety," she explains. "The structure I have here, along with the support I get from the staff and other women, changed my life. They forced me to come out of my shell a little bit. And they're showing me how to do things the right way, instead of me trying to figure it out on my own."

Today, Holly is sober and planning to go into nursing for a career. "I never thought I could do a job like that," she says. "But thanks to Open Arms, I'm more confident and successful. I'm a different person."





We're expecting 2,800 guests at our Thanksgiving Banquets

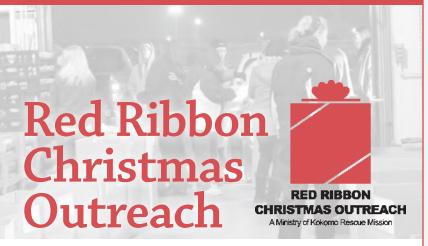

Once again, walkers can participate in a "simulation experience," which is an opportunity to understand the program and services Open Arms offers to the ladies and children who come to the shelter.

It is not too early to mark your calendar, contact friends to form a team, and come up with some clever ways to put "fun" into "fundraising" to benefit Open Arms, KRM's shelter for homeless women and children. Walk A Mile In My Shoes allows participants to step into the struggles facing homeless women and children. It is one mile round trip in length, from the Kokomo Rescue Mission (KRM) main Headquarters to Open Arms, the Kokomo Rescue Mission's shelter for homeless women and children.

Why hold this event in the winter? To help raise awareness in the community about difficulties the homeless members of our community deal with on a daily basis. Poverty and homelessness know no season.
