he Bible says we're only visitors in this world, and our real home is in heaven. I like that, because I know there's a better place and a better life waiting for me, and I'm looking forward to that.

My childhood was really bad. When I was 5 years old, I had a stepfather who beat and raped me for almost four years. He ended up going to prison when I was 9, but my life would never be normal. My biggest issue is selfesteem, not feeling like I'm good enough or that I'm very pretty. I was always a loner or I hung out with the kids who were always picked on. And I've spent my life getting involved with all the wrong guys. I got pregnant when I was 16 and didn't finish high school.

By the time I was 30, I had three children by fathers who couldn't — or wouldn't — support me or them. And I ended up with some serious health issues: I have diabetes, bad neuropathy, liver problems, and one of my legs swells up so bad I can't walk sometimes and I have to be hospitalized.

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Two years ago, I ended up homeless and came to Open Arms, but I left too soon. Now I'm back again, and

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I'm not going anywhere.

Thanks to Open Arms, I'm learning new skills to help me take better care of myself and my kids. They're also helping me manage my health issues better. But I think the most important thing Open Arms has taught me is that Jesus Christ is the answer.

When I look in a mirror, I don't see someone I like. But Open Arms has taught me to look in the mirror of Jesus. When I do that, I see someone who's beautiful looking back. I see who I really am, and someone's who worthy of Christ's love.

Thanks to you, because you support Open Arms, I know when I leave here I'll have the tools I need to lead a better life for me and my kids.


ive praise to the LORD, proclaim His name; make known among the nations what He has done." (1 Chronicles 16:8).

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Evan's New Path to Life

very morning, Evan, a 42-year-old guest at Kokomo Rescue Mission, gathers with other guys at the Mission to share what they're grateful for that day. "The other day, I said I'm grateful for peace of mind after living my whole life with that constant chaos and worry about how I was going to get more money for more alcohol," he says.

Evan grew up just north of Kokomo, where he was raised by loving parents who took him to a small country church every Sunday. But at age 16, he got a car, and for the first time discovered a whole other world of alcohol and drugs. Almost overnight, the "straight-A student and all-American kid went down the drain." Instead of heading to college, he dropped out of high school. He never recovered from the shame or the feelings of failure that haunted him every day.

"My whole adult life was one failed attempt after another to stay clean and sober," he says. "But when I was clean and sober, I was miserable. Why stay clean and sober if I was going to be miserable all the time? I just didn't want to face the reality of my life."

Nowhere to go but Kokomo Rescue Mission

He lost jobs and isolated himself more and more from friends and family. His dad was the last "steady rock" in his life. When his dad died in 2005, he spiraled even more out of control, eventually drinking almost half a gallon of vodka a day, until he ended up penniless and

homeless last February. He had nowhere else to go but the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

Suddenly, Evan was attending devotions and chapel five days a week. "God started working in my life, I know that," Evan says. "I had to get out of my own way and let

"I had to get out of my own way and let God take control and lead me."

God take control and lead me. That relieved a lot of stress and it's changed everything. I'm learning that all it takes is a little faith in God and to just do what I have to do today to glorify Him.

"This place gave me structure, hope, direction, and a new path to life."

October 30, 2016 is "Re-Stock Sunday," where you can help us stretch our ministry dollars.


Organize a collection of household items and supplies which will be used at the Mission. Items used throughout the year are things like:
