rowing up, Sarah was molested and raped multiple times by extended family members. Her oldest son is the result of one of those horrific encounters.

The facts of Sarah's upbringing are almost too terrible to fathom. The impact on her life is too tragic to ignore.

"I spent my childhood depressed and afraid," she says.
"I always felt like it was my fault somehow. All my life,
I felt like my only purpose on earth was to have sex.
It was the only way I could feel loved."

It's no surprise she started using drugs at 16. Then, by

"I spent my childhood depressed and afraid. I always felt like it was my fault somehow" the age of 21, she was arrested for her first drug felony and lost possession of her two children.

"I lost my babies," she recalls. "I gave up on them. When I got out of jail, I went right back to cocaine and heroin, because I just didn't want to feel anything anymore. I was suicidal."

In January 2016, Sarah overdosed and nearly died. She was arrested again on another drug charge. But this time, when she was released from jail, she came straight to Open Arms.

"For the first time in my life, I feel safe," Sarah says. "Ever since I was a kid, I felt like I had to have sex with someone to feel loved. But here, I feel loved by everyone — for free. I don't have to give them anything to feel loved."

For all her 26 years, the world told Sarah she wasn't worth anything, and she believed the lies. Open Arms has given Sarah the chance to learn a new truth.

"It's not always easy to hear the truth," she says. "But the

people here give me motherly love I never had. Sometimes it's hard love. Sometimes they tell me things I don't want to hear. But it's because they love me.

"I'm a Christian and I'm getting closer to God. I always felt like an abomination. But now, despite everything that's happened, I feel loved — by the people here at Open Arms and by God. I know it."

ast year, this guy invited me to smoke some spice with him and his friends. We'd had some trouble with each other, but I'm an addict, so I thought, sure, let's do it. Turns out it was rat poison. The guy tried to kill me. The pain was so bad, I prayed to Jesus, on my hands and knees, and promised that if He got me through this, I'd check into the Kokomo Rescue Mission and change my life. The Lord did bring me through it.

He's brought me through a lot of things. My mom was an abusive alcoholic. My dad was an abusive meth addict. We were so poor, we lived off the land, with no running water

or electricity. I started smoking pot and huffing gas when I was 10. I was in and out of trouble with the law. No one wanted me, and I was in foster care for a while.

In other words, I grew up with a lot of instability. I never learned how to make life work. So pot, pain pills, meth, spice, and alcohol helped me cope. It was easier to deal with drugs than real life.

# They introduced me to another lamb. The Lamb of God.

I got jobs here and there. Fell in love with a girl who became my full-time babysitter, so I could drink full-time. That lasted five years, until she kicked me out.

#### **I Kept My Promise**

By 2013, I was homeless on the streets here in Kokomo, sleeping in the woods near Jackrabbits Stadium, in abandoned houses, or under bridges — until that guy tried to kill me. I kept my promise to Jesus and came to the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

When I got here, I had no more hope. I was so miserable. But the Mission has taught me that Jesus is my only hope, and only through Him can I change my life. Thanks to the Mission, my walk with the Lord is the most important thing in my life now. And through the power of Jesus, my life is transforming more every day.

This Christmas, I don't have four dollars in my pocket, but I'm the richest I've ever been.

My life has changed so much. Thank you!

Once again, walkers can participate in a "simulation experience." This is an opportunity to understand the program and services Open Arms offers to the ladies and children who come to the shelter.

It's not too early to mark your calendar, contact friends to form a team, and come up with some clever ways to put the "fun" into "fundraising" to benefit Open Arms, Kokomo Rescue Mission's shelter for homeless women and children. Walk a Mile in My Shoes allows participants to step into the struggles facing homeless women and children.
