

My Growing Seeds of Faith

was an atheist for 20 years, and that's how I lived my life. I had one real goal: to satisfy myself. Everything was about me and what I wanted — and I wanted to drink.

Why did I do that? I really don't have any answers. I had a good childhood, loving parents, no big challenges or anything. But for some reason, I never felt like I belonged anywhere. I never knew who I was and nothing was ever good enough. Nothing, that is, but alcohol. I was well on the way to being a full-fledged alcoholic before I ever left high school.

I loved everything about alcohol: the taste, experimenting with different kinds, the courage it gave me at parties, and how it made me feel older.

I met my wife at Purdue University and carved out a career in sales. I ruined almost every job I had because of alcohol. My marriage ended after 17 years. The shame,

embarrassment, and self-doubt were overwhelming, but I always had alcohol to get me through.

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But in 2010, the legal troubles started — DUIs, public intoxication, resisting arrest, jail time. For years, my life was a blur. I tried to commit suicide, but I failed. By June 2016, I was evicted from my apartment, I had no job, and no money. All I had were a few personal possessions and the clothes on my back. That's when I came to the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

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There are a lot of great things about this Mission, but for me, it's been the chance to work in the kitchen and helping serve good meals to hungry, hurting people. Serving them has opened my eyes. It's given me a purpose outside of myself and helped me see who I really am. My heart is opening up, and I'm seeing signs of God that I can't ignore, so I'm slowly opening myself to a faith I resisted for so many years.

Thank you for supporting me and giving me this chance to grow.

reate in me a clean heart oh God, and renew a steadfast spirit in me." That is Psalm 51:10, and it's my prayer.

Growing up, my father was angry and abusive, physically, mentally, and verbally. especially toward my mother. So as I got older, that's what I thought "love" was. I also struggled with low self-esteem. I'm a big, shapely girl, and my dad always made me try to hide it. So I always hated how I looked. I'm self-conscious, and I put up with a lot of abuse in my life because I thought that was all I was worth.

I got pregnant at 17 and was forced to marry a man who didn't want to be a father, a husband, or married to me. I was raped at 21 and had another child. And by my mid-20s, I was a full-blown addict with four kids. I shoplifted and prostituted myself for drugs.

In 2011, I tried to get clean. But then I got involved with another abusive man, and then things got really bad. He got me into selling drugs. We lived in an abandoned house with no water or utilities. And he beat me every day. He beat me so bad once, I ended up having seizures and going to the emergency room. The only relief I ever had were the times I went to jail. But that's where everything finally started to change, too.

I got involved with a jailhouse ministry that surround me with love and acceptance I never experienced before. These people believed I could change, and I believed them. So when I got out of jail in the spring of 2016, I came to Open Arms.

When I came here, people here didn't see Deania the drug addict, the prostitute, or the "big girl." They saw me how Jesus sees me — smart, intelligent, and beautiful. And they hold that mirror up to me every day.

Today, I'm safe, sober, and I'm starting to believe what they see in me. They believe I'm going to make it, and so do I. Because Psalm 51:10 is my prayer. Every day.

Impact of Opiates in Central Indiana

We need to be aware of the impact of opiates in the lives of people. Please pray for our neighbors who are struggling with additions, this is not merely an "individual's problem" it affects families and our entire community. Here are some statistics from our area:

- Poisoning is the leading cause of injury deaths in Indiana
- 9 out of 10 poison deaths are the result of drug overdose
- 79.9% of drug overdose deaths were unintentional (not suicide)
- 61% of drug overdose deaths involved a type of opioid (including heroin)
- Less than 10% of overdoses occurred in people younger than 25 years old.
 - 23% were ages 25-34
 - 22% were ages 35-44
 - 27% were ages 45-54
