control." Those words remind me of where I never want
to be again.

Growing up, my dream was to be a rock 'n roll star. Music was a big part of my life. Responsibility and relationships, however, were not. By my mid-20s, I had two children with two different women. I left them all behind to hit the road and fulfill my dream. I felt a lot of shame over that, but alcohol and the stage always helped me ignore it.

Eight years later, I finally settled down. I rebuilt relationships with my kids, and I even married the mother of my second child. For 10 years, I lived a pretty quiet life —until I did the worst thing I ever did. I had an affair.

In 48 hours, I lost everything: my marriage, my business, my kids, my grandkids, and my self-respect. I was so ashamed, I went right back to what worked before. Alcohol. But this time, I was determined to drink myself to death. And it almost worked. I suffered renal failure twice. Yet somehow, in the middle of my mess, I realized my kids and grandkids still needed me. I still had something to live for. It was time to get my life together, and I knew I needed God to do it. So I checked into the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

Over the past several months, the Mission has helped me build a new life on a foundation of Jesus. Prayer and worship are a big part of my life now. I have experienced so much

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forgiveness, and I even have my kids and grandkids back in my life. When I gave up on myself and tried to drink myself to death, God never gave up on me. And now, thanks to your support for Kokomo Rescue Mission, I am a new man. Thank you.

ll my life, whenever I looked in a mirror, I didn't see anything beautiful. All I saw was ugliness and darkness, ever since my father molested me for three years when I was a child. My father eventually went to prison for what he did. But I've been in an emotional prison, as well, for more than 20 years.

As a teenager, I started using drugs and alcohol so I never had to face the ugliness in me. I started getting involved with abusive boys, because I always felt like I deserved their abuse. I had a child in my late teens, but I gave her up to my mother to raise, because what did I know about loving or caring for a child? After that, my 20s were a blur of hopelessness.

A few years ago, I had another a child, a son. I was determined to give him the love I never got. I quit drugs and alcohol, and I started going to a church. They never judged me. They embraced me and made me feel so welcome. But I simply could not believe God or anyone else could love me. So I left, and a week later I went to jail for some prior offenses. Like my first child, I had to leave my son with my mother.

After a few months in jail, though, the judge gave me the chance to come to Open Arms. When I got here, I went through the motions. But I still couldn't believe

anyone could love me. So one day, I went to tell the staff that I was leaving. But that's when everything changed.

Before I could say anything, I found out the staff got everyone together at Open Arms to throw me a surprise birthday party—and to reunite me with my son! Their love finally broke through my darkness. For the first time in my life, I truly felt loved by God.

Today, I know I still have a long way to go. But thanks to caring people like you, I know I have a future. You are such a blessing!



Taylor/Armstrong Renovation Project Nearing Completion!

For 66 years, the Kokomo Rescue Mission has been working in the community to help people restore their lives. This is the key aspect of our ministry program. The Mission's project to renovate the house on the corner of Taylor and Armstrong has been underway since 2017.

As of December 2018, the project has been fully funded, thanks to a grant from the Federal Home Loan Bank, and our partnership with PNC Bank. Other grants from FCA Chrysler and the Community Foundation of Howard County have also helped to fund this project. The renovation work is nearing completion with the plan to open the shelter in summer of 2019. The house will be used for an additional 16 to 18 shelter beds for single women.



The property was acquired by the Mission in 1983. It has been used for various ministries over the years. The Board of Directors and Staff are very thankful for the opportunity to

restore this property for more ministry work in our community. Please pray for the completion of this project and the staff for this shelter program.
