

At the End of My Rope -BY JASON

The rope was in place. I was ready to end my life. I had been depressed for months. My wife and I had been married for 28 years. We had our ups and downs over the years, but I thought we loved each other. We raised a family together. We supported each other through a lot of tough times. But that month, I got into an altercation with someone. No one got hurt, but I had to go to jail. Two days after Christmas, I got papers that she was divorcing me.

was going to do it. I wrote a note to my ex-wife.

"I could have been dead. But instead I'm alive in Christ."

I wanted to go to counseling, but she didn't. While I was in jail, she got rid of everything I owned—my driver's license, birth certificate, clothes, everything. I left jail on Valentine's Day—the same day the divorce went into effect. All I had were the clothes on my back. I didn't

know how to start over from scratch. I tried to think of some reason NOT to kill myself. I couldn't think of anything.

As I stood there with the rope, for some reason I started praying. I hadn't prayed in years, but suddenly I remembered someone in jail telling me about Kokomo Rescue Mission. I figured I should at least give it a try to see what they could do.

All I can say is, Kokomo Rescue Mission changed my life. They helped me replace my Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid cards. I opened a new bank account. They provided me with clothing, food, and shelter. They put me to work in the kitchen, washing dishes. But mostly, they gave me something new to live for again. My self-esteem got better. Then my faith in God began to grow, and I even got baptized. I could have been dead. But instead I'm alive in Christ.

Thank you for renewing my hope, giving me a second chance, and for saving my life.

A New Light Dawns in Amy's Darkness

early 25% of men and women devastated by homelessness also suffer from severe mental illness. Amy is one of them.

Amy's father died when she was 13, and her mother struggled with mental illness. Nevertheless, Amy thrived in school and later earned college degrees in journalism and pharmaceuticals.

"After college, I worked as a pharmacy technician for a while, then I ended up as a medical editor for a long time," she says. But by her 30s, Amy began to struggle. "I started to have issues with anxiety and depression, and I had trouble focusing my thoughts. Then it got harder to hold down a job, so there were huge gaps in my employment history, and it all got kind of jumbled."

As Amy's illness progressed, her thinking grew more "disorganized." Unable to keep up with her rent, she finally ended up homeless. She tried living in a car for a while, then on the streets. Her physical and mental health deteriorated until she was eventually hospitalized, diagnosed, and treated with appropriate medications to help her think more clearly. After her release, she went to

Open Arms to try to rebuild her life as much as possible.

"So many times, people who struggle with psychotic illnesses, like me, are highly intelligent people," Amy says. "There are so many stigmas against them, they get in a rut and can't get



out. Open Arms has been such a blessing."

Open Arms provided Amy with safety and is helping her get the psychiatric, mental, and dental help she needs until she can get on disability. She also works part time at Kokomo Rescue Mission's Care & Share thrift store, giving her some independence.

"Open Arms has been life-changing," Amy says. "I can't imagine a better place for me to be. They treat me with respect and dignity. Someday, I hope I can be independent again. But for now, I feel like I have a place to belong and a purpose, and I'm even growing in my faith. People who donate here are amazing. It's such a good thing!"



Watered Garden—A New Beginning

he core of the Kokomo Rescue Mission is restoration. Approximately 500 people will come to the Mission each year seeking a place to rebuild or restore their lives. They want to somehow put their lives back together; to go back in time to when life was stable and safe. God's promise of restoration, "I will restore you to health and heal your wounds, declares the Lord" (Jeremiah 30:17, New International Version), is a repeated theme throughout the Bible, offering hope when all else seems to contradict it. The Mission strives to offer that same hope.

The building located at the corner of Taylor and Armstrong, built in 1905, was in disrepair and had been used for storage in recent years. As many of you know, through grants and partnerships with many organizations, the building was restored to a beautiful place of shelter for women. The building truly reflects the image of healing and restoration both in its physical structure and in what it is providing women.

The Watered Garden shelter's "New Beginning" allows women to come in out of the storms of life and have a "New Beginning" too. More than just providing a safe environment, food, and clothing, they receive education and support to be able to begin rebuilding and restoring their lives.
