"I Was Really Resistant"

Mary didn't want to be here at first. But then your love broke through.

ary absolutely did not want to come to the Kokomo Rescue Mission.

But she didn't have much of a choice. A judge sent her to the Mission after she'd served a two-year prison sentence for drug possession.

"At first, I was really mad about it," she says. "I was hoping to go home, but the judge sent me here. I was really resistant. I was crying, and I felt like I couldn't do it."

But that would soon change, thanks to your patient compassion . . .

Mary's journey to the Mission started a few years ago in the wake of a split with her husband. Her ex moved away, leaving Mary, then 24, as a single mother of two. She was overwhelmed by life's new challenges.

"I started hanging out with the wrong crowd and got into

drugs," Mary says.

She had never used drugs before, but says drugs helped her to cope with the trauma of her split. She thought she was doing okay . . . till she got caught.

When Mary got into a minor auto accident while high on meth, police searched her car and found drugs in her purse. She was arrested, convicted and sentenced to two years. Her children ended up with her mother while Mary served her sentence.

Attitude change


Mary ended up at Open Arms — our shelter for women. She'd only been there a short time when she violated her probation by contacting a felon on her cellphone. She went back to jail for two weeks, and then was sent back to the Mission.


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An Encouraging Word from Van ...

"The Hands and Feet of Jesus"

Why this volunteer serves through our ministry

hen Cindy was teaching in the nursing program at Ivy Tech, she often brought her students to Kokomo Rescue Mission.

She taught psychiatric and mental health nursing, and she knew that many people in homeless shelters struggled with mental illness. And she wanted her students to meet people with much different backgrounds than their own.

"They kind of got their eyes opened to what the Mission

did," says Cindy, a registered nurse for 40 years before retiring in 2018. "And I tried to recruit some students from that group to come back here and volunteer after they got their degrees."

Some of those students have come back. And Cindy keeps coming back too, as one of our most faithful volunteers.

She says that the Mission was so helpful with her students, she wanted to give back in her retirement. Plus, she's totally on board with the Mission's work.

"I like their philosophy and what they do in our community," she says. "They are literally the hands and feet of Jesus Christ. It's an amazing thing."

Cindy regularly works in the Mission's warehouse, preparing things for the thrift store. She sorts clothing and prices it, getting it ready for sale.

And every Friday during the winter months, Cindy drives around town on a "food rescue" run, collecting food that grocery stores, restaurants and hospitals are about to discard. It keeps the food from going to waste and provides a much-needed service to the Mission.

"There's always a need for food," Cindy says. "I can't imagine being hungry. And I don't want other people to go hungry either."

"I Lost Everything"

But thanks to you, Daniel's life is back on track

D aniel keeps using the same word to describe his life of drug addiction before coming to Kokomo Rescue Mission: *Lost*.

He lost his job. Lost what was left of his money. Lost his car. Lost his apartment. Lost his family. And, for a while, lost his freedom during a jail sentence.

"I lost everything," Daniel says. "I lost track of what I was doing, and all of that led me here."

"Here" being the Mission, which Daniel's grandmother suggested at a time when Daniel felt quite lost himself.



Without the Mission, Daniel says he'd be dead or in jail.

"If she's giving me that advice, I'm going to take it, because my grandma wouldn't steer me wrong," says Daniel, 39. "So I gave it a shot."

And he's taken advantage of that shot, diving headfirst into our recovery program and working hard to turn things around.

"It really helps," he says. "They care about me, there's good structure, and they hold me accountable. I'm sober and clear-headed now."

Now the manager at a local pizza joint, Daniel likes his life today.

"Without the Mission, I'd probably be either dead or in jail," he says. "Instead, now I have a better understanding of what's going on, and I have a desire to do good. All because of the Kokomo Rescue Mission."

"And that's when my attitude changed," she says. "When I first got out, I had taken my freedom for granted. But when I went back to jail, I saw how quickly it could be taken away.

"That's not the life I wanted anymore. I wanted to change, and I wanted to do what I needed to do. Because I didn't want my kids to see me in jail again. I didn't want to put them through that."

With that kind of motivation, Mary was now all-in with the Mission and our life-changing programs. She's opening up to the staff about her issues. "Because they're really good listeners. They've helped me realize that I can't, and I don't have to, do everything on my own," she says. Mary says her faith has gotten a lot stronger at Open Arms, that she goes to church weekly, and that she plans to be baptized.

She is now reunited with her children, working toward her goal of saving up enough money to get her own place and ready for her best Christmas ever.

"If it weren't for the Kokomo Rescue Mission, I definitely would not be where I am today," Mary says. "I'd probably be back in jail or, honestly, dead. But now I feel equipped to tackle life."

Mary is grateful for supporters like you who made it possible for her to turn her life around. And so are we!
