Your kindness gives hope during the holidays.

hristine knows the joy of Christmas because she is filled with the joy of Christ. But it was a long, hard road to get there.

Her mother disowned her as a child, and they remained estranged for 40 years. Christine's grandparents raised her in a loving home, but the separation from her mother left lasting trauma.

A few years ago, Christine's mother said these harsh words: "I just carried you. You are not my daughter."

For years, whenever someone said the word "mom," Christine would be filled with "anger and animosity toward her, and it would eat at me. I was having nightmares."

Christine turned to drugs, partly to numb her pain, partly to fit in. "Meth became my coffee in the morning," she says. "The more hectic life got, the more I depended on it."

When a drug bust landed her in jail, Christine decided she'd had enough of the pain. She read a book about forgiveness, and decided to forgive her mother.

"It was immediate relief," she says. "It was a weight off me, and it broke chains for her as well."

When Christine was released from jail, she came to Open Arms to continue her recovery, to stay on solid ground and to enjoy a restored relationship with her mom. The Mission has helped.

"I was meant to be here," she says. "The support has kept me following my faith, and now I feel ready to step out as a strong woman of faith."

Thanks to your help, Christine recently moved into her own place, which she has enjoyed decorating for Christmas!





Many of those we serve know what it's like to be homeless, to sleep on the streets, to have no place to lay their head.

They have felt what it's like to have "no room at the inn."

Joseph and Mary experienced that as they desperately sought a warm, safe place to have their child. Instead, they spent that night essentially on the streets, in a dirty stable, surrounded by animals and dung and straw.

It's unbelievable, isn't it? That the baby Jesus — the son of God — would enter the world in such an environment?

But in that astonishing moment, the angels broke into song:

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased.

"I Lost Everything"

Decades of drug abuse were costly. But now things are looking up.

Leslie looks back on the last 30-plus years with a lot of regret.

He'd been a successful businessman and had opportunities for a good life. But he threw a lot of it away with drug addictions, including about a

decade on meth.

But not quite everything. Now he's got a chance to gain some things back.

He came to the Mission last year from drug court, where he was facing a 12-year sentence. He says he's motivated to turn his life around this time — particularly as he reflects on his poor choices over the years.

"It's discouraging to look back and know what I've had, with a successful business, and think where I am now," Leslie says. "But at the same time, I know I've had success before, and it gives me confidence I can do it again."

In the meantime, he's working the programs at the Mission, learning the tools he'll need to stay sober and live clean. He says the spiritual emphasis is helping too.

"I'd gone to church off and on," he says. "But this time, I'm paying attention in church, I'm reading the Bible too, I'm taking notes. I'm trying to get closer to God."

He's saving money and eager to live independently again, reunited with his wife and his 10-year-old son. He says he has a good relationship with all his kids, ages 10-22.

"I want to be a better father to my kids," he says. "They deserve it. And so do I."

Nothing at the Bottom of a Bottle

With your support, Kim is leaving that old life behind.

Kim has emptied enough bottles in her life to know that she never wants to go there again.

"I really want to succeed in life," she says. "You can't do that with a bottle. Nothing's at the bottom of that bottle."

Nothing but heartache and pain.

But then, heartache and pain are what made Kim turn to the bottle in the first place. Her mom died when she was 6. Her dad died when she was 21 ... and a new bride and mother. Her husband died after 12 years of marriage.

Tragedy after tragedy.

"I've dealt with a lot of death," Kim says matter-of-factly. "A lot of trauma."

She has tried to quit drinking a number of times over the years, but has had relapse after relapse.

Several times, she came to the Mission for help, and found it. But it'd be two steps forward, and one step back.

"This time, my actions are going to prove I've changed."

"I would always put too much on my plate and get overwhelmed," she says. "I was working, going back to school, doing my chores around here, helping in the thrift store, going to meetings. It was too much."

This time around, Kim is trying to focus on one thing at a time and not get overwhelmed.



Her faith is helping Kim restore her life and relationships with her children.

"The staff here is very supportive," she says. "They have an open-door policy, any time you need to talk.

"They're nonjudgmental. They're stern when they need to be to keep you on track, but with a lot of compassion and understanding. And my faith has gotten a lot stronger this time."

Kim believes she now has the tools she needs to succeed, and that with God's help, she'll stay sober this time. And she's motivated to restore her relationship with her children, now 19 and 22.

"When I was drinking, they never knew the mom they were going to get," Kim says. "Happy mom? Or angry mom? I did a lot of damage. But this time, my actions are going to prove I've changed."
